Who are we?




The Joint Service for Disabled Children comprises:

- Assessment







The Short Breaks Hub

- This year we have formed our Short Breaks Hub in order to separate the statutory social work role from the short break component
- The short break hub are responsible for setting up short break packages for children and young people, reviewing care and support packages and working with community organisations to expand our local offer portfolio.
- The family support worker works with families to develop Positive Behaviour support plans at home.



The Short Breaks and Family Support Team



- Deliver after school, holiday and weekend group activities
- Home care and home sitting
- Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) practitioners and coaches
- Members of restrictive practice reduction network
- Sleep practitioners
- Makaton training including safeguarding
- Manual handling trainers
- Mental Health first aiders
- Price Physical Intervention trainers
- NSPCC Safeguarding trainer
- Casual staff (approx 80)
- Creche to support parents to access training



Early Intervention Support Service Pre-school Support Team Early Support Keyworking team

Through home visits to the family, virtual/video consultations and offering places in closed specialist groups, the team of teachers, specialist early years practitioners and keyworkers:

- Provide support and guidance for families of babies and very young children with significant levels of SEND and complex medical needs
- Advise and support with a range of issues including specialist benefits, housing, charities and sources of help
- Assist with hospital discharge planning
- Assess the child's developmental level and in consultation with the parent, identify next steps to support progress



Early Intervention Support Service Pre-school Support Team Early Support Keyworking team

- Provide opportunities to meet parents of other children with SEND at specialist groups tailored to the specific needs
- Advise parents about their education options; Terrific Two's, 3&4 year old funded places and entry into school
- Support parents with applications and school visits to mainstream and/or special schools
- Support the transition into an educational setting; arranging transition meetings to share information, advise on inclusion, training for settings and assist with goal setting
- Providing statutory professional advice reports for EHCP
- New partnership established with EASA in Sept 2021 to develop autism services in the early years



Operational Support

- First point of contact for parents and professionals
- Operational and financial management
- Progress Short Break Grants and Direct Payments including e-cards
- Communicate panel decisions to the Hub, Social Work Team, referrers and families
- Manage performance data
- Building management and health & safety
- Progress portal referrals to the Social Work Team

Short Breaks

- Commission play and leisure opportunities
- Commission agency home care
- Provide Short Break Grants for activities and services
- Direct Payments
- Subsidise play scheme places
- Working in partnership with families and providers to extend the range the play and leisure opportunities
- Deliver training to providers to help with inclusivity

Transition from childhood to adulthood

- Provide informative, advice and support through an annual programme of events called Moving On
- Transition Implementation Group (strategic)
- Transition Operational Group
- Develop "easy read" information for young people
- Contribute to development and implementation of a transition safeguarding strategy



Our Voice co production

- Successfully implemented the swim survey and arranging classes for children. Disability friendly swim introduced.
- Monthly head of services meeting with Our Voice .
- Head of Service and SEN attending our voice fun days quarterly on Sundays and providing surgeries for parents attending the event.
 JSDC also provides three support worker from our short break team to help facilitate the event.
- Successfully co-writing the winning bid £37k from NCEL CYPMH Winter Pressure Fund to train parent and support their mental heath and wellbeing.
